1, centre in 2022

Dear readers,

This time, as I look back on what has happened in the past year, I feel more than ever that everything has "gone by so quickly". Writing the annual report is an opportunity to stop and look at what has been accomplished.

In 2022, some reform projects implemented by the Ministry of Health and the Ministry of Labour and Social Affairs were still underway.

As part of the Ministry of Labour and Social Affairs' project, part of our team was working on developing the **Quality Criteria** and piloting the **Quality Audits** for the mental health centres. We organised a webinar on the CARE approach for the Ministry of Health and held a course on **Recovery and Care Planning**.

It is also slowly becoming apparent that the past period, when the Czech Republic was supported in the reform of mental health care by the European Structural Funds, was a unique "window of opportunity". It is very likely that further changes will be much slower and there may be steps backwards. This makes it all the more important to continue the activities that we are involved in. Our **Education for Improving the Human Rights Situation of People with Mental Health Issues** project is an excellent example of how to work to transform attitudes and increase the competence of

inpatient mental health professionals to minimise the use of restraint. We continued our pleasant collaboration with **Domov Na cestě** - the flagship of the transformation of residential services in the Czech Republic, by producing an evaluation report reflecting on their latest project so far.

We managed to keep our Recovery College running, we helped train peer tutors to teach at the Jihlava Polytechnical University, and we were honoured to contribute to the launch of a Recovery College in Bratislava. We also took an important step in thinking about a new **recovery college concept**. This should be more based on a strong motivated team in the future and become as **flexible** as possible in identifying interest in courses and in adapting to the people it is intended to support and connect.

An example of the new approach is the international project **Education and Empowerment for Transition to Community**, in which our lecturers prepared an 18-hour educational programme for patients in two wards of the Kosmonosy Psychiatric Hospital.

As part of our cooperation with CARE Network, we participated in two major **international meetings in Split**.

In **Moldova**, we are implementing a major training of supervisors and the involvement of peer workers in local mental health services and preparing to start sheltered housing for clients of institutions. We have also managed to get a grant for peer training in **Georgia**, which is running very promisingly so far. Supporting peers in these countries is really groundbreaking here and we see the responsibility that this brings.

Not everything went well. Although we were very keen to have our **Stopstigma** internet counselling service taken over by a stable service provider, we did not succeed. A unique counselling service that had been operating since 2004 and in which people with their own experience have been working as counsellors for the last 8 years alongside professionals, had to be closed. During its existence, almost 4,000 enquiries have been answered and the counsellors deserve a big thank you for their many years of honest work.

Our organization also managed a **negative economic balance**. This was due to a number of factors, most notably a sharp increase in energy prices, the need to stabilise the organisation's operational support and the mandatory share of project funding. The loss has been covered from the reserves of previous years and the

economic condition of the Centre is good. We continue to have a financial reserve and can even afford to co-finance some projects from our own resources.

Thanks to the project team, the Centre's consultants, lecturers and many other collaborators. It has been an honour and a pleasure to meet you and to change mental health care for the better.

2, educational institute

In 2022, we implemented 44 training courses, which were successfully completed by a total of 600 participants. Tailored courses, mainly run for mental health service providers, were almost double the number of open courses in 2022 (29 tailored, 15 open). Three **Model CARE** courses initiated in the previous year continued, and 4 courses were either fully delivered this year or were initiated with overlap into 2023.

The Centre has been selected as one of the training providers within the project of the Ministry of Health of the Czech Republic "Support for the introduction of a multidisciplinary approach to people with mental health issues". In the period from June to September 2022, we had the opportunity to successfully implement in all 14 regions of the Czech Republic a two-day training programme called **Recovery and Care Planning**, which is based on the

principles of the **CARe** model and is designed especially for members of multidisciplinary teams in mental health care.

In addition to the **CARe Model** mentioned above, the **Basic Course for Peer Specialists** continues to be the most popular in the long term, having been held seven times this year. After a longer period of time, this year we also opened the training **Specifics in the work of community psychiatric nurses**, certified by the Ministry of Health, which was successfully completed by 10 participants, some of whom came from Slovakia. In cooperation with the Dutch lecturer Marlie van de Berg, we managed to organize a **Basic Training in the Yucel method**, which is so far known only abroad, but some organizations have already expressed interest in its use in our country.

4, other activities

With a team of external collaborators, we continued the **pilot quality audits in mental health centers** within the project [Development and Support of Quality Models for the Social Services System](#), implemented by the Czech Ministry of Labour and Social Affairs. A total of 15 audits were carried out. Mental health centres that passed the audit received feedback on their work and suggestions for further development. At the same time, the experience and lessons learned were used to adapt the quality criteria available for further use in the evaluation and development of mental health centers.

We continued to organise and support the **IPS platform** meetings. Representatives of organisations and teams that use the IPS method in their work met a total of four times in 2022. The meetings continued to be dedicated to sharing experience and good practice and supporting each other, while we also focused on specific topics in each meeting, inviting external experts. Thus, we focused on specific support from peer workers, working with people with dual diagnosis or discussing the benefits of IPS and the advantages and disadvantages of the sheltered market. Due to the great success in the previous year, in addition to the regular meetings in Prague, we repeated the outgoing meetings, this time in Fokus České Budějovice. Since 2018, we have been collecting and evaluating data for the IPS statistics, which in 2022 involved 14 teams.

We have closed one chapter of our long-term **cooperation with Domov Na cestě**, which has been ongoing since 2018. We have followed with interest and admiration the transformation of the service of the home with special regime and its subsequent development and deepening in three follow-up projects, which we have participated in the **evaluation** of. The project completed in 2022 was inspired primarily by the Dutch ART methodology, aimed at supporting the recovery of people with serious mental illness who are long-term clients of residential services. We tried to capture the process of change and its impact in evaluation reports.

In 2022, the **CARe Platform Czech Republic** continued its existing activities with the intention to disseminate recovery-oriented practice, but at the same time began to consider its further development (supporting the role of CARe coaches in teams, implementing coach training or a follow-up CARe course). A large amount of work to develop the model was done during the project, which was completed in 2022 and whose results and outputs can be found on our website: [Rozvoj psychosociální rehabilitace podle modelu CARe](#). In 2022, the 2nd CARe Summer School and the CARe Platform Symposium took place, both events with international participation. In 2022, the Centre for the Development of Mental Health Care continued to work closely with the [CARe Network](#).

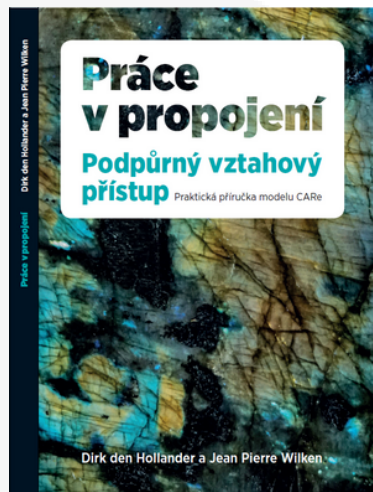
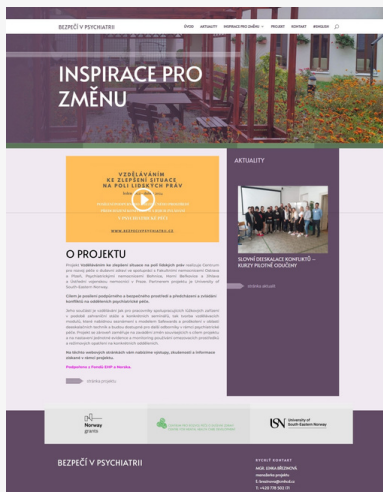

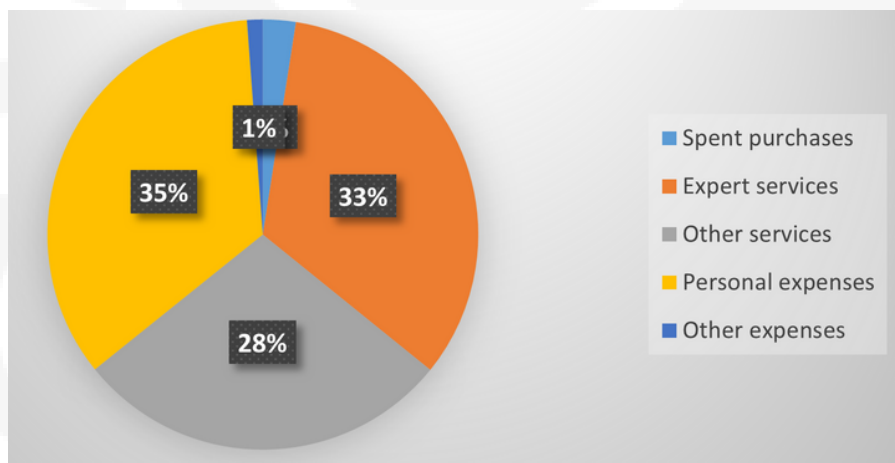
7, finances

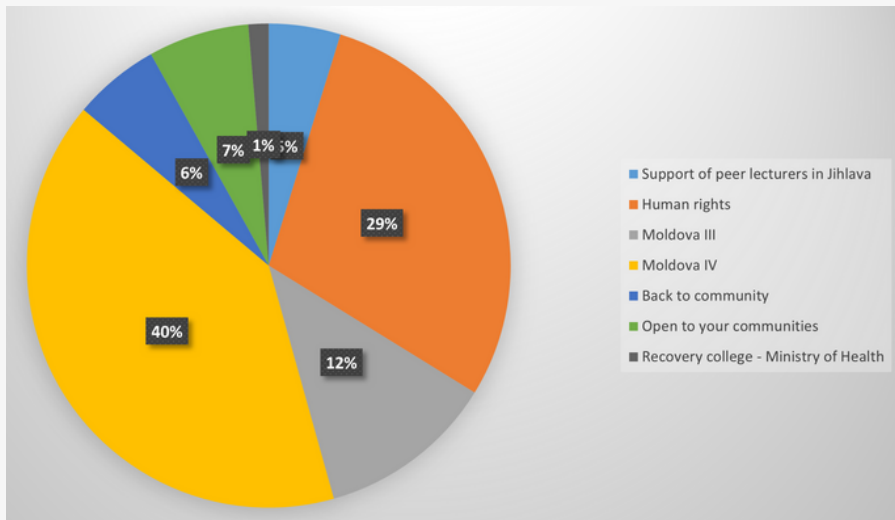
